The theme for the Last Chance Audubon March Lecture Series is Montana hunting and fishing to acknowledge the current exhibits on hunting and fishing at the Montana Historical Society. The programs begin at 6:30PM the first four Thursdays of March and are held in the Auditorium at the Montana Historical Society at 225 North Roberts Street.

March 2nd – Waterfowl Conservation

Bob Sanders, Manager of Conservation Programs for Ducks Unlimited, will talk about DU's efforts to conserve waterfowl production areas in Montana and provide hunting opportunities.

March 9th – Ethics and Conservation of Hunting

Jim Posewitz, retired Montana FWP biologist (1961-1993) and recipient of the Montana Wildlife Federation Conservationist Award of 2015, will talk about the ethics and conservation of hunting. Posewitz is the author of *Beyond Fair Chase: The Ethics and Traditions of Hunting* and an ardent advocate of ethical hunting.

March 16th - Wild Trout Management


Dick Vincent, retired fisheries manager from FWP, will talk about his research on the Madison River in the 1960s and 1970s that led to the current Wild Trout management philosophy, and the cessation of stocking hatchery trout in rivers and streams.

March 23rd – Tribal Hunting and Fishing History

Tom McDonald, manager of Fish, Wildlife, Recreation, and Conservation Department for the Confederated Salish-Kootenai Tribe, will talk about the history of tribal hunting and fishing on the Flathead Reservation.

As an added attraction, the Historical Society has offered to show the original *Audubon Birds of America: From the Original Drawings*, 1860, archived in the collections. Showings will be from 6 to 7PM on the 16th and 23rd in the MHS Library on the 2nd floor.
