A trek that covered the length of Patagonia from Coyaique in the North to Punto Arenas in the South during November - December, 2016 will be presented by Joel Maes. After a brief review of the history of the region, he will describe the highlights of his 15-day journey, including the Marble Chapel on Lake General Carrara, Cerro Torres and the Fitzroy in Los Glaciares National Park. LCAS Fieldtrip Report: Freezeout WMA April 1 & 2, 2017

Sunday's sunrise didn't disappoint. The sky to the east was shades of pink, orange and yellow, and the thousands of Snow Geese flew right over our heads, catching the sunlight as they honked and went on their way. Mike Schwitters later said he estimated over 2400 white geese flew over that morning.

After answering our questions, Mike led us to various vantage points to watch incoming geese land on the lakes as only they can – by soaring and circling, lowering their altitude, until splash-down.

Other bird species encountered over the weekend included Cormorants, Pelicans, Great Blue Heron, Canada Geese, Trumpeter Swans, Northern Harriers, Red-tailed Hawks, Bald Eagles on nest, Golden Eagles, Sandhill Cranes, Killdeer, Ring-billed Gulls by the hundreds, Western Meadowlarks, and, after dark, a Great Horned Owl on nest as well as another owl species – possibly a Short-Eared Owl.

We had a total of five participants in our LCAS field trip group, and we look forward to offering it again next year. ---Janice Miller, Trip Leader

President's Perch: Science

It appears we are a group of scientists.

We at Last Chance Audubon stepped up in strong numbers to participate in the Long-billed Curlew Survey (LBCU) going on this spring. Organized by Montana Audubon's Amy Seaman, this is the fourth year for the survey in the Helena Valley and other nearby areas of LBCU habitat. This project provides valuable data on how the Curlews are faring in our region of the world. So a big, "THANK YOU," to all who are identifying Curlews for the sake of science.

World Shorebirds Day in September is another data-collecting opportunity in which LCAS has been participating at the south end of Canyon Ferry. The Golden Eagle Migration Survey (GEMS) in the Big Belt Mountains each fall is another science-based survey, giving us a picture as to the health of our raptor species, specifically the Golden Eagle, and is strongly supported by the members of Last Chance Audubon.

Several LCAS members regularly use eBird to document the birds they see whilst out and about. This is a worldwide database documenting bird sightings and their trends, around the globe. You can check their findings on the LCAS website under "BirdTrax" at http://lastchanceaudubon.org/html/BirdTrax.html.

International Migratory Bird Day is happening NOW at the Helena Regulating Reservoir on York Road – Saturday, May 6th. There will be bird walks early and booths for school children to learn more about our birds. Kids, bring your parents! It's FUN!

And, David Ringer, from National Audubon, will be the keynote speaker at the MT Audubon's Wings across the Big Sky Bird Festival in Great Falls, June 9, 10, & 11th, connecting the National Audubon with the local chapters across the nation and making the data-collecting connection from local to national. You don't want to miss it!

Through scientific data-collecting programs and projects, we are best able to chart our course towards "...education, habitat protection, and environmental advocacy" as our LCAS mission statement affirms. Blackswift Volunteers Needed!

Do you enjoy bird adventures? Willing to hike and gaze at waterfalls? Enjoy scrutinizing wet cliff faces for obscure moss nests? Enjoy birding at dawn and dusk? If you're like the majority of birders in Montana, you've never seen a black swift. This summer could change that!

Montana Audubon has funding this year to expand on our citizen science effort to look for additional swift nests in Montana, including potential sites in the Bitterroot. Amy Seaman will be putting on two training sessions this summer: one in Glacier National Park and one outside the park. Both will be held in mid-July and will be limited to 12 people. She even has a little bit of funding for mileage and stipend for those of you who are able to complete a training, and then commit to doing one survey.

If you'd like to participate in this project, please contact Amy at aseaman@mtaudubon.org. Join the echelon of cool birders out there who tell others that they are "going swifting," and remember that "swifting" is not for the faint of heart. Surveying for this bird requires long hikes, tremendous patience, and difficult terrain navigation, including at night. But it sure is fun!

Who Are You?

The chapter sent this letter to Zinke, Tester, and Daines after hearing the final talk at this year's Natural History Lecture Series by Tom McDonald of the Salish-Kootenai Wildlife Division. As a Congressman, Zinke supported transfer; he now has reversed himself and opposes it.

April 12, 2017

Dear Secretary Zinke:

We are writing to you regarding the Confederated Salish-Kootenai proposal to assume complete management of the National Bison Range at Moiese. The current proposal would transfer the property to the Secretary of the Interior from the National Wildlife Refuge system. Those opposing the transfer are demanding that in order to prevent precedence that a new refuge of equal value would have to be added to the national system. This is highly unlikely under the Trump Administration which has proposed a cut of \$120 million (75%) for new land acquisition for the Dept. of the Interior. Our organization believes that this is a special circumstance since without the commitment of land and management of the bison by the Salish-Kootenai Tribes, the species would probably be extinct. We also believe that the tribes would be effective in educating the general public about the historical importance of bison to Native Americans and their effective management of the animal over thousands of years. In addition, the Confederated Salish-Kootenai Tribes would manage the refuge at no cost to the American taxpayer.

We ask that Congress act immediately to restore federal trust ownership of the National Bison Range to the tribes.
